The temperature gets as high as thirty-five degrees Centigrade (100 degrees Fahrenheit)! As we walked into the gymnasium of D'Arcy McGee on Monday, November 28, we had no idea how much we'd be affected in the next 60 minutes by one person. The chatter of the student body slowly died down and soon, all that could be heard throughout the room was an emotionless, computerized voice telling the very emotional story of Jade Bell.

Jade started his story at the very beginning, telling us

how death had been a part of his life since a young age. He told us that when he was 11, his friend hung himself. Around the same time, Jade started drinking and smoking excessively. By the age of 21, he had had his first injection of heroine. He overdosed five times until finally, his body couldn't take it anymore. On August 22, 1997, the 22 year old decided to take injections of cocaine and heroine, a bad decision made under the influence of alcohol. He overdosed and suffered 15 minutes of oxygen deprivation and fell into a coma for a month. When he woke up for the first time, Jade seemed perfectly healthy. His family was relieved and his doctors were speechless by the fact that he didn't have any damage to the brain. However, he only had time to ask the nurse for a martini before he fell back into a coma. The next time he awoke, he couldn't walk, talk or see, he was confined to a wheelchair with only partial use of his limbs and he needed attention and care 24/7. The fact that he didn't suffer any cognitive damage still amazes doctors. (Cognitive damage refers to one's inability to think, learn, imagine, remember, or make decisions; "the means by which an individual becomes aware of people, objects and situations in the environment and their subjective, symbolic meaning".)

Somewhere in the middle of his presentation, Jade showed us a short documentary called "The Wrath of the Dragon". The short film came with warnings of severely disturbing scenes filled with swearing and images of violence, and death. However, the video tells it like it is; no hiding the truth, no softening of the edges; it gives the audience a first hand look at the regular life of a junkie as the camera follows around several teenage kids from Coquitlam, the hometown of Jade. "Once is too many times, 10,000 times is not enough," says one addict. After the video, Jade goes on to say that from the time that video was made in 1999 to this day, he is most likely the only one still alive. Even through the monotone droning of his computer, you can hear the sadness in Jade's words.

At the end of Jade's presentation, he asked two students to read his poems and rewarded them with a compilation CD of his favourite songs and a book of his own poems. Then he invited people to come up and shake his hand or give him a hug, saying that he wouldn't bite. More than half of our school's population (including teachers and staff) went up. No one shook his hand; every individual embraced him in a long hug, whispering their gratitude in his ear and introducing themselves. The simple gesture of his hugs brought nearly everyone to tears.

"I thought it was great, it changed my mind about everything. It was really powerful to actually see him in front of you, suffering," Kelli Cockerell states, and she's not the only one. Nat Gauthier says that the presentation was a wake-up call for her and for many other D'Arcy students. I personally was amazed by the fact that he still has the ability to smile and laugh and have fun. "I can't believe he is still able to smile after all that," Sam Dupont said.

Jade will continue with his journey across Canada's Lower Mainland, teaching students about the consequences of drugs and while he may not be able to save the world, if he reaches at least one kid, it will make his efforts worthwhile.

How The D'Arcy Voice is Made

Have you ever wondered just how we make The D'Arcy Voice, how the articles get written, how the pages get set up, where the graphics come from? Well, soon you'll know.

The D'Arcy Voice usually starts off with brainstorming. We try to think what the next issue's theme will be, what we will write about, and when we'll release the paper. Once that is done, we start to write.

Writing articles is probably the most important part of the process, besides, what would the paper look like with no text? Usually the articles are written until there is no more space left in the paper, and then the extra articles get filed away for future use.

While all this is going on, the layout crew is busy trying to design the visual feel of the upcoming issue. We consider when The Voice will be released, and what most of the articles are about. Often, we look outside at the weather and try to reflect it in The Voice. We also try to figure out where the text and pictures are going to go. Overall, we try to make the paper look good enough to sell.

As people finish their articles they email them off to the layout crew, which is also in charge of some editing. The articles are quickly edited, and then placed in the paper.

Simultaneously, the graphics designers & photographers are busy trying to get images for the paper. The photographers run all around the school snapping photos, while the graphics designers stay in front of the computers busy working with Adobe Photoshop & Illustrator.

As all the pieces of the puzzle come together the layout crew fits everything together and get it ready for printing. When everything is together, and the paper is edited, they run off a few copies on the classroom printer.

At this point a class member runs down the the photocopier, and transfers The Voice to its 11x17 paper. After rushing back with a few hundred copies, people start to

fold the papers.

Once the folding of the newspapers is done, energetic volunteers grab the copies and sell them in the cafeteria for 25¢ each, and once selling is done an unprintable copy of The Voice is put up on the website.

And there you have it; how the D'Arcy Voice is made, from brainstorming to publishing.
